THE CORE CURRICULUM CHECKLIST

You will learn much more about LR's Core Curriculum after you get here; for now, here is a streamlined list of requirements. **For your first semester, you should select classes from FYE, Foundations, and Level I areas. You should also consult the list of major courses to see what is recommended for your major.**

First-Year Experience: FYE 191-192 (or LRU 101/102, for transfer students with 26+ hours earned since HS graduation)

Foundations (must be completed in first two years):

- COM 111
- LRU 050 (or 060)
- CSC 115 or higher
- ENG 130 (if needed); ENG 131 (**must be completed in first year**)
- Foreign Language (two semesters: CHI, FRE, GER, GRE, SPA, SED)
- HES 100 + activity (or 287 or 288)
- MAT 090/105 (if needed); MAT 113, 115, 125, 129, 165, or 215
- REL 100

Level I - at least one in Fine Arts; two in the others, in different subject areas (or 188 may be repeated under different titles):

- Fine Arts (3 hours total): FIN 188; ART 200, 205, 206, 211, 221, 223, 225; DAN 101-204; ENG 281; MUS 112, 151 [except Marching Band], 200; THR 110, 200, 260
- Humanities: HUM 188; EDU 188; ENG 233; HIS 101, 102, 115, 201; PHI 100- or 200-level; REL 101-299 (except 125 and 126)
- Human Society and Behavior: HSB 188, ECO 121 or 122, CRJ 230, POL 120 or 140, PSY 100, SOC 100
- Natural Sciences: NAT 188, any lab-based course from AST, BIO, CHE, EAR, ENV, PHY, or SCI 110

Level II - two of the courses, depending on major (**should be completed in junior/senior years**):

- FIN 388, HSB 388, HUM 388, NAT 388 (GLS 388G may substitute for one)
- Capstone: each student must complete a Core Capstone presentation in connection with one of the two Level II courses selected

Professional Development: LRU 410 or approved major-specific course (COM 460, EDU 423, EDU 426, HCS 457, HES 321, NUR 420, NUR 487, or REL 460).

Global Learning: a full semester of study abroad, or five credit hours of "G" designated courses or foreign language beyond the Foundations requirement, or a combination of the above. Courses from the Core and/or a student's major may apply.

You will also engage in several co-curricular experiences each year, as part of the Convocation Program. These opportunities touch on many different aspects of life, such as personal wellness, professional development, creative endeavors, and community service.
